College Prep Curriculum

- Academic planning is provided to ensure that all students are completing WSSA's college preparatory graduation requirements.
- Along with "core" courses, students are encouraged to take electives that will help them explore their interests and discover new strengths.
- Each WSSA student is required to take the College & Career Prep Course, taught by the Associate Dean of College Counseling, during their 11th-grade year.
 - This course covers topics such as career exploration, college exploration, executive function, accommodations in college and the workplace, budgeting and banking, paying for college, writing a resume, interviewing for jobs, and more.



Other College & Career Prep and Support

- Accommodated PSAT, ACT, and SAT testing is offered on-campus for 11th and 12th-grade students.
- An after-school test prep program (in partnership with Method Test Prep) is offered during Spring of 11th grade.
- In-depth Orientations and workshops are offered each year to prepare students for what is ahead.
- Individualized meetings with the Associate Dean of College Counseling for guidance on college and scholarship applications, choosing a college, requesting accommodations, and more.
- All graduates are enrolled in the Winston CARES Alumni Support Program for continued access to guidance, resources, check-ins, etc.
